For several years, there have been discussions by the MACPO Board and within the Directors Committee about the issue of membership and voting rights within the MACPO organization. After significant consideration, the MACPO Board is recommending that the By-Laws be amended to allow for two classes of membership. There will be Regular Voting Members and Associate Members. Regular Voting Members are those who have been appointed to County those who have been appointed to County Probation Officer positions by their Court. Associate Members are those who are working as probation officers, administrators, vendors, or retired members in other corrections delivery systems. Regular Voting Members are the only members permitted to vote and serve in an elective office. Associate Members may participate on MACPO committees and are otherwise eligible to participate in any MACPO activity. Please review the By-Law changes which are available on our website as we will be voting on the change at our Friday morning meeting.

However, in the current political climate, MACPO needs to remain a clear, cohesive advocate for resources necessary to perform our work in CPO Counties. Times have changed and we believe that we need to make changes too.



'Pot Tarts' and 'Buddafingers' Manufacturers Busted DEA arrests 12, seizes marijuana-laced candy and soft drinks in San Francisco Bay Area

MAR 16--OAKLAND, CA – Drug Enforcement Administration ("DEA") Special Agent in Charge ("SAC") Javier F. Peña announce today the arrest of Kenneth AFFOLTER, 39, of Lafayette, CA, and eleven other individuals on charges of distribution of marijuana. Agents served five federal search warrants on March 16, 2006, without incident. Three warrants were served at warehouses located in Emeryville (on the Oakland border), one in Oakland and one at AFFOLTER's residence in Lafayette. All searches conducted were at locations associated with AFFOLTER. As a result of the searches law enforcement seized four sophisticated indoor marijuana grows, thousands of marijuana plants, a large amount of U.S. Currency, two semi-automatic weapons, one revolver, and hundreds of pot laced candy and soft drinks.

SAC Peña stated, "In a way, this case sort of answers the

question, 'What will they think of next?' What so many people don't realize is that innocent children will somehow get their hands on these products and think they are just normal candy or soft drinks - thus, making this action not only illegal, but potentially tragic."

This investigation began in October 2005, when the DEA Oakland Resident

Office obtained information that AFFOLTER was operating Beyond Bomb, a manufacturer of marijuana candy in Oakland, CA. The marijuana laced candy and other edibles manufactured by the company mimic

the name and appearance of well known name brand candies and products. Some of the product labels seized by investigators include Stoney Ranchers, Munchy Way, Rasta Reece's, Buddafingers, Pot Tarts, Double Puff Oeo, Tri-Chrome Crunch, Keef Kat, Twixed, Budtella, Puff-A-Mint Pattie, Puffsi, Bong's Root Beer, and Toka-Cola.



This investigation was conducted with the assistance of the Richmond Police Department, Oakland Police Department, Vallejo Police Department, Lafayette Police Department, Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement, Contra Costa County Narcotics Enforcement Team (CCNET), and the Alameda County Narcotics Task Force (ACNTF).

This case is being prosecuted by the United States Attorney's Office in the Northern District of California. The charges are only allegations and the defendants are presumed innocent unless proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt.

Council on Crime and Justice Minnesota 2005 Project Summaries

In 2005 the Council's research, demonstration and advocacy projects currently range from an analysis of and action around the disproportionate representation of people of color in Minnesota's criminal justice system, to a study of the impact of the incarceration of a parent on his or her children, to launching a culturally specific public awareness campaign focused on crime victimization issues faced by the Somali community, to effective parent and community involvement to support learning in homes and communities for educational success.

Racial Disparity Initiative (RDI): Examines the causes and consequences of the racial disparities in Minnesota's criminal justice system with the intent of advocating for future policy change aimed at addressing the disparity.

2005 RDI Research Projects: Minneapolis Traffic Stop and Search Audit; Plea Negotiations Study; Root Causes Study; Juvenile Offender Study; Hawthorne Study; Children of Incarcerated Parents Study; Disproportionate Minority Confinement Study.

<u>Healthy Educational Lifestyles Project (HELP):</u> Provides reentry services for offenders of color with an educational component and a health management emphasis related to HIV, AIDS, Hepatitis C and other STDs.

<u>Families & Offenders United Project (FOUP):</u> Works with inmates who are fathers to provide and measure the benefits of pre-release parenting education and re-entry planning, combined with post-release services focused on employment training, parenting, and community ties.

<u>Youth Education Support Project (YES):</u> Beginning in October 2005, this project will work with the Minneapolis Public School System to promote effective parent and community involvement to support a culture of learning in homes and communities for educational success.

<u>Safe Streets First (SSF):</u> Monitors and provides treatment to repeat DWI offenders, to reduce recidivism. Crime Victim Liaison Project: Assists all victims of misdemeanor crimes in Minneapolis to navigate the judicial process and provide input into their cases.

<u>General Crime Victim Services (GCVS):</u> Provides a 24 hour hotline for victims of crime and advocates on their behalf in Hennepin County. Lock changes and emergency home repairs are also offered to crime victims at no charge.

Somali Community Outreach Project: A new General Crime Victim Services Project will support the planning and development of a culturally specific public awareness campaign focused on crime victimization issues faced by the Hennepin County Somali community.

The Rest of Their Lives: Life without Parole for Child Offenders in the United States By Human Rights Watch

Children can and do commit terrible crimes. When they do, they should be held accountable, but in a manner that reflects their special capacity for rehabilitation.

In the United States, however, all too often their punishment is no different from that given to adults. In forty-two states and under federal law, the commission of a serious crime by youth under eighteen—indeed in some states children as young as ten—transforms them instantly into adults for criminal justice purposes.

Children who are too young to buy cigarettes legally, who may not have started to get facial hair, who still have stuffed animals on their beds, are tried as adults. If convicted, they receive adult prison sentences, including life without parole (LWOP).

A sentence of life without parole for child offenders is cruel, unfair, and unnecessary. It sends an unequivocal message to youth that they are beyond redemption. It erroneously presumes that other forms of punishment would not serve the public's interests equally well. It also ignores the differences between adults and children—differences we accept as a matter of common sense, and which science fully recognizes.

Co-Offending and Patterns of Juvenile Crime December 2005



Juveniles often commit crimes in pairs or groups, a process known as co-offending. An NIJ-sponsored study of delinquents in Philadelphia found several patterns related to juvenile co-offending. The researchers linked co-offending with increased risks for recidivism and violence. Interaction among delinquent peers seems to instigate crimes and escalate their severity. The youngest offenders were more likely to co-offend and were more likely to become violent if their earliest crimes were committed with violent offenders, even if those crimes were not violent. The researchers recommend early intervention targeting very young offenders, especially co-offenders, although more research is needed. But, they also caution that some interventions may enhance the effects of co-offending by placing youths in groups that unintentionally provide negative peer learning.



FBI Fights Cyber Crime

The Internet Crime Complaint Center (IC3) was established as a partnership between the Federal Bureau of Investigation FBI) and the National White Collar Crime Center (NW3C) to serve as a means to receive Internet related criminal complaints and to further research, develop, and refer the criminal complaints to federal, state, local, or international law enforcement and/or regulatory agencies for any investigation they deem to be appropriate. The IC3 was intended, and continues to emphasize, serving the broader law enforcement community to include federal, as well as state, local, and international agencies, which are combating Internet crime and, in many cases, participating in Cyber Crime Task Forces.

Since its inception, the IC3 has received complaints crossing the spectrum of cyber crime matters, to include online fraud

in its many forms including Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) matters, Computer Intrusions (hacking), Economic Espionage (Theft of Trade Secrets), Online Extortion, International Money Laundering, Identity Theft, and a growing list of Internet facilitated crimes. Since June 2000, it has become increasingly evident that, regardless of the label placed on a cyber crime matter, the potential for it to overlap with another referred matter is substantial. Therefore, the IC3, formerly known as the Internet Fraud Complaint Center (IFCC), was renamed in October 2003 to better reflect the broad character of such matters having an Internet, or cyber, nexus referred to the IC3, and to minimize the need for one to distinguish "Internet Fraud" from other potentially overlapping cyber crimes.

IC3 Mission Statement

IC3's mission is to serve as a vehicle to receive, develop, and refer criminal complaints regarding the rapidly expanding arena of cyber crime. The IC3 gives the victims of cyber crime a convenient and easy-to-use reporting mechanism that alerts authorities of suspected criminal or civil violations. For law enforcement and regulatory agencies at the federal, state, local, and international level, IC3 provides a central referral mechanism for complaints involving Internet related crimes.

Significant and supplemental to partnering with law enforcement and regulatory agencies, it will remain a priority objective of the IC3 to establish effective alliances with industry. Such alliances will enable the IC3 to leverage both intelligence and subject matter expert resources, pivotal in identifying and in crafting an aggressive, proactive approach to combating cyber crime.
